



### How to play:

The player who was born the farthest away from the Chiemsee is the one to start.

### Here is, what they can do:

- They can either draw one card from the deck or take the one next to it and add it to the cards in the hand.
- If they want, they can lay out families or groups on the table, if they have at least four that fit together.
- They can use jokers, if they want. But there have to be more regular cards than jokers in the family or group.
- If they have laid out cards in the previous rounds, they can add suitable cards to own families or groups.
- Finally, they put down one card from their hand face up on the pile next to the deck.

Now it's the next player's turn. (They play the same way.)

### End of a play-round and billing:

When a player got rid of his last card (add it to a group or put it away next to the deck) the round is over. Now you have to count the points of each player and note it on the paper.

**Attention: Finishing is not allowed in your first turn!**

Ending a round is rewarding, because you get **20 additional points.**

The overview-cards show you how many points each player has been able to gain.

**Example 1: At the end of the round Will has on the table:**

- group of 5 family-members (Schwarzbichler) = **30 points**
- group of 6 great grandpas = **70 points**
- group of 4 cats = **30 points**

→ So Will gets for this round  $30 + 70 + 30 =$  **130 points**

**Example 2: At the end of the round Florentine has on the table:**

- group of 7 family-members (Rotschindl) = **60 points**
- Royal-Kini (4 Ludwig-jokers) = **200 points**

**Additionally, she ended this round (got rid of her last card).**

→ Bonus = **20 points**

→ So Florentine gets for this round  $60 + 200 + 20 =$  **280 points**



### End of the game:

You can play as many rounds as you like. After each round you add the points of every player to the paper.

### **The winner (Kartl-Kini = king of cards)**

is the one who could finally collect most of the points. HE (or of course SHE) had been most successful in bringing people together and therefore is the KING (or QUEEN) of fellowship.
